We write on behalf of over 300 women who work in film, television and theater. A little more than two months ago, courageous individuals revealed the dark truth of ongoing sexual harossment and assault by powerful people in the entertainment industry. At one of our most difficult and vulnerable moments, Alianca Nacional de Campesinas (the National Fortmorkerk Womens Aliance) seru us a powerful and compassionate message of solidarity for which we are deeply grateful.

To the members of Alianza and farmworker women across the country, we see you, we thank you, and we ocknowledge the heavy weight of our common experience of being preyed upon, horassed, and exploited by those who abuse their power and threaten our physical and economic security. We have similarly suppressed the violence and demeaning horassment for fear that we will be attacked and unliked in the process of specificial out. We share your feelings of anger and shame. We harbor fear that no well be attacked and tweek or that we will be dismissed; and we are terrified that we will look week or that we will be dismissed; and we are terrified that we will be feed or never hired again instationism.

Unfortunately, soo many centers of power – from legislatures to boardrooms to executive suites and management to academia – lack, gender parity and women do not have equal decision-making authority. This systemic gender-inequality and imbalance of power fosters on environment that is ripe for obuse and horassment against women. Therefore, we call for a significant increase of women in positions of leadership and power across industries. In addition, we seek equal representation, oppertunities, benefits and pay for all women workers, not to mention greater representation of women of color, immigrant women, and lesbam, biseaud, and transgender women, whose experiences in the workforce are often significantly worse than their white, cispender, straight perex. The struggle for women to break in, to rise up the ranks and to simply be heard and acknowledged in male d-administed workplaces must end, times up on this impenterable monopoly. **JANUARY 1, 2018** We are grateful to the many individuals – survivors and allies – who are specking out and forcing the conversation about sexus horossment, sexual assault, and gender bios out of the shadows and into the spotlight. Now, unlike ever before, our access to the media and to important decision makers has the potential of leading to real accountability and consequences. We want all survivors of sexual horassment, everywhere, to be heard, to be believed, and to know that accountability is possible.

We also want all victims and survivors to be oble to access justice and support for the wrongdoing they have endured. We particularly want to lift up the voices, power, and strength of women working in low-wage industries where the lack of financial stability makes them vulnerable to high rates of gender-based violence and exploitation.

This is often because survivors, particularly those working in low-wage industries, doth have the resources to fight back. As a first step towards helping women and men across the country besk justice, the signatories of this letter will be seeding a legal fund to help survivors of sexual assoult and horassment across all industries challenge those responsible for the harm against them and give voice to their experiences.

We remain committed to holding our own workplaces accountable, pushing for swift and effective change to make the entertainment industry a safe and equilable place for everyone, and telling women's stories through our eyes and voices with the goal of shifting our society's perception and treatment of women.
